A Big Mahalo for 35 Years of Community Support!

As we joyfully celebrate SCCH's 35th year, we look back with deep gratitude for all who have supported the Center from the time it was a dream of the founders, Terry Fisher and Judy Hormell. Their

vision was to establish an interfaith counseling center where all faiths and spiritual paths would be honored as potential sources of strength, and mental health services would be accessible to all. It was Rev. Bob Nelson who connected them with the Samaritan Institute (now the Solihten Institute), and its nationwide network of counseling centers. With guidance from the Samaritan Institute, the dedication and fundraising of the founding Board of Directors, and the offices provided at First United Methodist Church, Samaritan Counseling Center of Hawaii opened its doors to clients 35 years ago.

The Center's first decades were times of both growth and tragedy. SCCH thrived and grew but also suffered the sudden death of our first Director, Rev. Dr. Michael Anderson 1991, and in 2001, the tragic death of our second Director Rev. Dr. Phyllis Roe. The financial hard times of the great recession of 2008-2009 also challenged the Center. Despite these setbacks, the support of dedicated staff, Board of Directors, community partners and generous donors kept the Center going. I must mention Jolene and Robert Gerell, who gave SCCH its original endowment funds and continued generous support through the years. We celebrate and thank all of you who have supported and accompanied us on our 35 year journey, including the clients who have trusted us with their pain, loss, joys, and search for meaning and understanding.

Today, SCCH has a skilled, Executive Director, Rachelle Chang, a strong Board of Directors, an outstanding multidisciplinary, licensed clinical staff, with five counseling sites in Honolulu, Pearl City, and Wahiawa, and many wonderful community partners. We are able to accept most insurance plans, participate in employee assistance programs, and continue to subsidize costs for clients without insurance or ability to pay through our Client Assistance Fund. We are living our mission and fulfilling the dreams of our founders. There is a lot to celebrate and we invite you to celebrate with us! Watch for the announcement of our Anniversary celebration in the fall.

I look forward to celebrating together.

Curious Diana Honeker, Clinical Director, LMFT

What might Walt Whitman, Ted Lasso, and a yoga teacher all have in common? How about the words, "Be curious, not judgmental." This sentence came to me from three very different directions, and maybe this is why it hit so hard, because it is hard to be

curious, rather than judgmental.

Feel that feeling of judging. We must arrive at a conclusion; make an evaluation; is this good or bad?

Feel that feeling of curiosity. We feel open, not needing to decide anything.

Richard C. Schwartz, PhD, is the creator of the psychological therapy Internal Family Systems (IFS). Dr. Schwartz summarizes the healthy qualities of the Self and Self-leadership with his eight C's: calmness, clarity, compassion, confidence, courage, creativity, connectedness, and yes, **curiosity**. He writes, "When we are able to become nonjudgmentally interested in even our most despised inner demons (such as contempt, racism, and self-hate), we find those internal dialogues to be enlightening and transformative. Buddhists call this kind of nonstriving, open curiosity toward our inner thoughts and emotions 'mindfulness.'"

Dr. Schwartz challenges us to be our higher, healthy selves by being curious, being mindful. It is only with an open heart and a curious mind that we can become transformed internally, as well as being a part of transforming the world externally.

So I ask you to ask yourself, "Can I challenge myself to be more curious, rather than judgmental today?" You may find yourself more mindful, more kind, to yourself and the world around you.



Community Impact Report 2023

Everyone deserves to have the quality mental health care they need to be healthier and heal from wounds. With your help, we honored our promise to assist people regardless of their financial situation, serving 296 clients and providing 3,822 counseling sessions. Thank you for your caring and compassion!

2023 was a very fulfilling year. We presented 11 free mental health education workshops, participated in the O'ahu Charity Walk and NAMIWalks Hawai'i, hosted our first "Drive Fore Mental Health" Golf Tournament, and welcomed David "Kawika" Rich as our Board President. In addition, after a rigorous site accreditation visit with Vice President Steve Duson, we achieved National Accreditation from the Solihten Institute.



Our vision is for everyone in Hawai'i to have access to quality behavioral health counseling that integrates their spirituality, as appropriate, to enhance health and wholeness.

The main barriers to health care are cost, access to licensed therapists, and the stigma of mental illness. To address barriers to care, we advocate to:

- Increase payments from Employee Assistance Programs (EAPs), Medicare, and Medicaid.
- Streamline the process for licensing and credentialing therapists, including therapists who have a provisional license.
- **Fund the true costs** of providing care, including operations, and adjust for the cost of living.

We improved operations by switching online billing providers for cost savings; upgrading to a virtual phone system for greater flexibility; and enrolled with a payroll services provider to streamline payroll and human resources. We also negotiated rate increases and more effectively matched counselors with insurance plans.

Waiokeola Congregation Church is honored and humbled to be a part of Samaritan Counseling Center Hawaii's Ohana. Our name, Waiokeola, means 'water of life' in Hawaiian and makes our partnership even more meaningful.

In John 4, Jesus was traveling from Judea to Galilee and had to pass through Samaria. Though many Jews avoided Samaria because they considered Samaritans as half-breeds and looked down on them, Jesus chose to go through it. On his way, he stopped at a well where he met a Samaritan woman. She was surprised when Jesus asked her for water because Jews did not interact with Samaritans.

However, Jesus had a different intention. He did not come to get water, but to give her Waiokeola. "If anyone thirst let him come to me to drink ... out of his heart shall flow rivers of living water." (John 4:10-12)

Jesus loved them and came to offer hope, healing, and salvation to everyone, including the Samaritans. He loved people regardless of their social status, background, or ethnicity.

Our partnership allows Waiokeola Congregational Church to support Samaritan Counseling Center Hawaii's efforts to help everyone, just as Jesus offered living water to the Samaritan woman. We are grateful for this opportunity to make a positive impact in our community and pray for God's continued blessing on SCCH's efforts.
